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# Kitchener-Waterloo Art Gallery Celebrates \$106,627 in Federal and Provincial Funding for dynamic digital programming

**Kitchener, ON** — On Thursday, local representatives met with the team at the Kitchener-Waterloo Art Gallery (KWAG) to celebrate \$106,627 in funding they received through grants from the Government of Canada and the Government of Ontario. Thanks to this support, KWAG has been able to make major improvements to their online programming and website.

The COVID-19 pandemic fundamentally affected how KWAG's audiences were able to experience contemporary art exhibitions and programming. KWAG sought new initiatives to broaden its reach to the Kitchener-Waterloo community, pivoting to online programming, and later following a hybrid format of on-site, off-site, and online offerings.

In May 2023, KWAG was awarded a \$54,400 Resilient Communities Fund grant from the provincial government's Ontario Trillium Foundation, which funded consultations and assistance to invest in a major upgrade to the Gallery's outdated website infrastructure. The sleek, new website is a design-friendly, AODA compliant digital platform. Digital competency training was also implemented to ensure all staff and volunteers develop the software skills required to support the visitor the visitor experience.

Through the Community Services Recovery Fund, the Federal government awarded KWAG \$52,227 to further enhance the Gallery's digital capacity. This funding will allow for additional research to ensure a promising future of virtual programming and resources.

Together, the grants from the Government of Canada and the Government of Ontario have allowed KWAG to enhance their digital capacity and offer new programs and services online to better serve their community.
