KWAG Calls for Student Artwork for Expressions 51: Forging a New Path

6 November 2025, Kitchener, ON -The Kitchener-Waterloo Art Gallery is proud to announce that it is accepting submissions for *Expressions 51: Forging a new path*, the annual exhibition in collaboration with the Waterloo Region Catholic District School Board and Waterloo Region District School Board. The Gallery is accepting submissions from students in Junior Kindergarten through Grade 12 until Sunday, 7 December 2025.

For half a century, KWAG's *Expressions* has showcased artwork from student artists in Waterloo Region, highlighting their unique perspectives of the world around us and experiences within it. This year, young artists will reflect on intergenerational connectedness as a force for building sustainable futures.

"These young visionaries remind us of our potential to shape a better world, rather than merely accepting what we inherit," remarks Hannah Braithwaite, Programs Lead, Community Engagement and Learning.

Organized by KWAG's Public Programs Department, *Expressions* has previously attracted 150 local school board and home-schooled students from JK through Grade 12, including KWAG's Youth Council.

"When the Gallery first opened in a bicycle shed behind Kitchener Collegiate Institute, our founders understood the importance of art education for youth," explains Shirley Madill, Executive Director. "That vision continues as 2026 marks the Gallery's 70th anniversary and is still going strong. The arts are crucial to creating well-rounded and forward-thinking learners and leaders, and we are proud to collaborate with schools, parents, and teachers to secure a creative future for our young people."

The students' works displayed during *Expressions 51* will hang beside a selection of art from the Gallery's Permanent Collection-chosen in keeping with this year's theme. Including works from the Collection fosters a connection between the pieces the Gallery holds in trust for the public and the students of the region, who are, in essence, the emerging artists.

Upcoming programming for the *Expressions* submission process includes a <u>Teachers' Evening</u> at the Gallery. "We are hosting an evening to celebrate the passionate teachers that support young artists—teachers who register for this celebration will spend the evening making art, viewing current exhibitions, and learning about student opportunities," says Braithwaite. "We know that teachers are essential in ensuring valuable art education is present in the classroom. Thanks to the support we receive from the Waterloo Region District School Board and Waterloo Catholic District School Board, we can hold *Expressions* as well as subsidize <u>School Programs</u> related to the Gallery."

More than 1,100 students are expected to visit the gallery with their schools during the exhibition, in addition to those who attend with their friends and family outside of school hours. *Expressions 51: Forging a new path* will officially open to the public on Saturday, 24 January 2026, with a public reception.
