# Urban Visionary Carol Coletta to Speak at KWAG's Culture Talks Series

The Kitchener-Waterloo Art Gallery continues a series of conversations on the creation of socially conscious cities with the upcoming presentation <u>Culture Talks: Art, Architecture, the Public Realm and Social Infrastructure</u>. This popular series returns on Thursday, 6 November at 6:30 p.m. with Carol Coletta, a nationally recognized leader in civic design and public space innovation—known for bold, people-first approaches that connect communities and expand opportunity.

KWAG's series of Culture Talks stems from the Gallery's commitment to civic engagement, in which it takes seriously its role as an art museum in city revitalization and explores the future role of artists and architects as cultural placemakers. This year, the series takes a deeper dive into the essential functions of social infrastructure—the network of services and facilities that support community well-being, promote social equity, and drive economic growth.

"Waterloo Region is immersed in an exciting period of rapid growth," explains Shirley Madill, KWAG's Executive Director. "With a goal of reaching 1 million and with shifting demographics, there will be a higher demand for areas that are culturally vibrant, walkable, and amenity-rich - places that support the well-being of our citizens. This demands an integrated approach that shows the importance of arts and culture in social transformation. With our partners, Perimeter Development Corporation, Waterloo Region Community Foundation, and Grand Valley Society of Architects, we believe that these talks contribute to our region's success in an urban and social transformation."



With Coletta's longstanding focus on inclusivity and public spaces, it comes as no surprise that she was recently selected as the 2025 recipient of the Urban Land Institute's highest honor, the ULI Prize for Visionaries in Urban Development. The award recognizes Coletta's lifelong commitment to shaping inclusive, vibrant, and equitable cities through innovative public spaces and civic partnerships.

"We need to start with the intention of mixing, welcoming, and belonging. It doesn't just happen; you need to be intentional. One of the toughest aspects is getting people across demographics to come together, particularly across income.\(^{1}'' - Carol Coletta\)

Carol Coletta is the former President and CEO of Memphis River Parks Partnerships, a public-private partnership responsible for five miles of public property on the Mississippi River. She led a new riverfront concept plan with extensive public engagement, the renaming and redesign of two parks with confederate associations, and the design and construction of Tom Lee Park, winning international acclaim for its designers Studio Gang and SCAPE.<sup>2</sup>
