

## Art Grows Here: KWAG Unveils Community Garden Installation and New Exhibition in a Celebration of Summer and Sustainability.

**14 May 2025, Kitchener ON** -The Kitchener-Waterloo Art Gallery presents a dual exhibition launch featuring the innovative <u>50/50 Garden of Resilience</u>—a living installation merging art with sustainable agriculture—alongside the exhibition, <u>Couzyn van Heuvelen: CAMP</u>.

The 50/50 Garden of Resilience serves as both a functioning community garden addressing local food insecurity and a decolonial artistic statement that challenges traditional conceptions of land value. Tended by the local gardeners, the site provides an opportunity for community members to grow organic vegetables, fruits, herbs, and

flowers, while fostering intergenerational and intercultural learning through community collaboration and mutual aid.

KWAG's weekend of celebration is a testament to our community's resilience and creativity, thematically influenced by <u>CAMP</u>, which explores Inuit cultural sovereignty and land-based practices. It creates a space that celebrates our collective efforts in community building around food while addressing critical issues of self-determination and food sovereignty in the North. The artist will be joined by the Curator Leila Timmins for a tour of the exhibition on Saturday.

The weekend also features the launch of the new monograph <u>Billy Gauthier: Sila</u>, documenting KWAG's groundbreaking mid-career survey of the renowned sculptor's work, which explored globalization's impacts, extraction industries, and modernization efforts affecting Indigenous populations. The launch features a roundtable with the artist, Mark Bennett (designer), Logan MacDonald (author), and Darryn Doull (curator).

KWAG's programming for the weekend includes a variety of engaging activities for all ages including the official Garden Launch Celebration, Garden of Resilience Weekend Activities, a Food Drive and Seedling Exchange in support of <a href="The Food Bank of Waterloo Region">The Food Bank of Waterloo Region</a>, free and paid workshops such as Cyanotype and Flower Pounding Tote Bag Workshops, plus a Summer Style Swap to gather unwanted, clean clothing, shoes, and accessories—all designed to welcome the community to this new space of cultural and ecological significance.
